March 29 - April 6, 2016




























Among Those Who Will Start a Business Upon Graduation








Preferred Location to Work

Among Those Who Will Look For Employment After Graduation














(By Student Type)



Likelihood of Recommending Province as a Place to Live and Work








Amount Currently Owed in Student Loans







Q.23: How much do you currently owe in student loans? (n=4643)








